\$\$\$  **Orloff.** Built in 1798 by Catherine the Great for Count Orloff, who came to Greece with a Russian fleet to try to dislodge the Turks, this archontika still retains the splendor of the past with the added benefit of modern amenities. The heavy single shutters, which were used to defend against attack, have been preserved, and antiques—walnut furniture, paintings, and lithographs—grace the lace-curtained rooms. No two are alike; those categorized superior rooms have sitting areas and color TVs (about 8,000 dr./€23.59 more), and all have minibars and views of the town or the pretty courtyard, shaded by a mulberry tree.
